Winnipeg General Strike - May 15, 1919

The infamous Winnipeg General Strike begins. Twenty-five thousand Winnipeg workers go on strike. The workers are orderly and peaceful and enjoy broad public support. The employers, city council and the federal government panic. On Sunday, June



21 (Bloody Sunday), the police attack a large assembly of strikers. They kill two and wound 30. The unions abandon the strike four days later.

The Winnipeg General Strike of 1919 was one of the most influential strikes in Canadian history, and became the platform for future labour reforms.
